

## **Exploration Resources:**

- <u>Program Review</u>: this guide helps identify areas of clinical and administrative work, workflow, and resources that might be important to consider when planning to implement (or enhance) a medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) program. The purpose of this review is to identify potential gaps in service and/or barriers and facilitators that can be leveraged to successfully integrate MOUD within your clinical services.
- <u>Community Partner/Resource Identification Worksheet</u>: The purpose of this worksheet is to brainstorm organizations and services within your community and/or region that may be critical partners to enhancing your program's capacity to provide SUD services.
- <u>Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT)</u>: SBIRT is an evidencebased process for assessing patients for substance misuse and possible substance use disorders. The following screening tools and guides can help develop a screening protocol:
  - <u>NIH Screening Tools: Tobacco, Prescription Drugs, etc</u>.: The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIH) has a Screening and Assessment Tools chart to help providers locate the appropriate screening tool.
  - <u>Pocket Guide: Drinking risk and Motivational Interviewing</u>: This is a convenient, two-sided card created to assist providers in screening patients for risky substance use and providing a brief intervention when necessary. Focused on alcohol, this could be used for other substances.

## Preparation Resources:

- <u>Training and Education</u> PCSS-MOUD has a large <u>repository of resources</u> for providers with the goal of offering the most effective evidence-based clinical practices in the prevention of OUD through proper opioid prescribing practices, identifying OUD, and treatment. We've chosen to highlight the following resources for Implementation:
  - <u>SUD Healthcare Team</u>: This is a four-module, introductory course on Substance Use Disorders designed to provide fundamental information for all staff working within a healthcare setting.
  - <u>SUD 101 23 modules</u>: This 23-module curriculum provides an overview of evidence-based practices in the prevention, identification, and treatment of substance use disorders and co-occurring medical and psychiatric conditions for a variety of populations.
    - Module 2: Changing Language to Change Care: Stigma and Substance Use Disorders
  - <u>8-hour DEA Training</u>: We provide several options for prescribers to complete the required DEA 8-hours for the <u>MATE Act</u>. Choose 8-hour training <u>here</u>.
  - <u>Video Library</u>: PCSS-MOUD has developed a library of videos that can be useful in your practice and to share with your patients. Video topics include Buprenorphine, Methadone, Naloxone, Naltrexone, Pain, Stigma/Language, and Treatment.

- <u>Clinical Pathway for Medications for Opioid Use Disorders</u>: This infographic visually lays out the process of initiating buprenorphine for a new patient.
- Guidance/Checklists: These resources include tools, templates, clinical and administrative guides that can be tailored to your program:

  - Office-Based Opioid Treatment (OBOT) Minimal Requirements and Best Practices (ORN Guidance): This document includes recommendations for minimal requirements for office-based opioid treatment (OBOT) and best practices for OBOT.
  - Fentanyl Guidance: Practice-Based Guidelines: Buprenorphine in the Age of Fentanyl (PCSS Guidance): Provides practical clinical practice-based guidance, based on available research combined with emerging clinical experience, on the use of Buprenorphine in the treatment of individuals using fentanyl and other highly potent synthetic opioids.

## Implementation Resources:

- <u>Mentor Program</u>: The PCSS-MOUD Mentor Program offers *three* mentoring options depending on your needs:
  - <u>Discussion Forum</u> Post questions, search topics, and connect to a group of over 5,000 providers. The forum can be accessed 24/7 for clinical guidance.
  - <u>Ask a Clinical Question</u> Submit specific clinical questions to our lead "mentor on call" and receive a response within 1-2 business days.
  - <u>One-on-one Mentoring</u> connect with a clinical expert for individualized guidance via email or phone.
- Opioid Response Network (<u>ORN</u>): like PCSS-MOUD, the ORN is a SAMHSA-funded project that provides free technical assistance to providers and communities.
